Determining our shared vision of the near future for GREEN...

- Member survey October
- Focus group discussions (FGDs) late November, early December

Will set the framework to guide us in 2025 and beyond

Top 3 priorities from the member survey:

- Sharing knowledge
- Thought leadership
- Resource mobilization

Why we want to mobilize resources:

- Lack of funding
- Underfunded area

What we want to learn:

- Focus on sharing the existing knowledge
- Need to be aware of greening through capacitybuilding initiatives, sharing best practices
- Learning more about the issues/where they intersect
- Deeper understanding of climate education and how it integrates in our work
- Learning about diverse approaches
- Bridge the gap between conceptual knowledge and practical application
- Increase our joint capacity to generate and promote best solutions

Who we want to learn from:

- More lived experience
- Invite smaller, lesser known groups
- Hearing from the actual people taking action on the ground or impacted by climate
- Practical insights from those who have successfully implemented green initiatives

How we want to interact:

- More structured mentorship or peer exchange programs
- Collaborations enhance knowledge generation
- Connecting to like-minded practitioners
- Structured mentorship and peer exchange within GREEN





It would be great if GREEN could facilitate connections beyond the education space - learning from other sectors, as I suspect we're trying to separately solve some similar problems.	Sharing what is not working, and why. Often coordination spaces are really focused on success, which is good - but we miss opportunities for learning/progress as a result.


- learning, evidence, best practices
- what are the resources available, what can we ask members to bring
- topic assumes knowledge exists that needs to be shared could also create and generate new knowledge, ID gaps in knowledge - e.g. outline of "systematic review" of what's available - template of key topics to review, generate what's state of the art on these topics, where gaps are - signal to those with resources where they may want to invest them
- how do we hear from local organizations, bring them into this forum, reach out to them to be heard - ID them and share the space meaningfully (sharing their work here, helping their work on the ground) - give voice and support in their work

Notes:

- do we plan to work locally, how could we do that
- how could we build out a library on our webpage, some type of knowledge management system - the minimum for starting sharing knowledge - but requires time and resources – or find ways to partner, link to others' systems/libraries (INEE, GADDRESS) - also avoid KM fragmentation



Our topic is very broad. I think we should set clear priorities.	Invite a panel of experts to oversee the development of a white paper on the education/climate change nexus: issues, future thinking, etc. From that white paper, 1) build out a network-wide learning agenda and 2) find funding for the agenda. (We have identified potential funders.)	I think we should clearly and explicitly identify the audiences for our work, including thought leadership pieces we disseminate. Who do we expect to take what actions, under which conditions?	coming up with innovative research questions	It means the possibility to advocate for climate change solutions as a strong network rather than in isolation.
A shared, high-level learning agenda would be really valuable.	The TLG could develop a list of topics from the survey and invite specific experts to discuss these topics		With clear priorities, GREEN could help amplify the voices of those directly affected by climate change who don't have the means to advocate for themselves.	Pushing ourselves beyond our own limitations - how can we be inspired by other sectors and experiences from other issues to drive our ambition? How are we thinking about climate education in the context of an unknown future?






Notes:

- Setting priorities this year of the network our priorities have been set by network participant interests/areas of work on current events, but to set priorities we may have to look to the future
 - Creating a white paper takes money, time, and staffing which GREEN doesn't have enough of but we could identify what research is out there and review and create more digestible material about that material (blogs, blurbs, mention in the newsletter, etc.) and set a learning agenda based on that information
 - Shy away from producing "new" materials that only reiterate information that is already out there instead focus on finding gaps in research that already exists and creating digestible materials based
 on those findings
 - If we create a learning agenda or something similar based of these findings, that could help with funding
- Identifying countries that are doing something interesting and inviting them to speak on their experiences- idea that we need to be more "on the ground" and in touch with work being done actively
- Thinking beyond present day being a thought leader by thinking about/discussing the future and what's going to happen in a world we don't yet know (i.e. what will happen when countries disappear into the ocean? what will happen to those children? how can we talk about this even if it isn't *currently* happening)


